he routes our hosts and guests take to HomeShare Vermont are all unique. For guest Amelia, it was her parents who nudged her in our direction.

"Just after I graduated from UVM, my parents who are wonderful people said, you've got your degree, it's time for you to go," Amelia explained. "It was said with all the love in the world. I had seen a Home-Share Vermont flyer at the UVM Medical Center building where I was working, so I signed up. I got a call back and they said they found a host they'd love for me to meet."

That host is Susan, a retired fourth grade teacher

who lives in Shelburne. Susan originally contacted Home-Share Vermont years ago when she was living in Wells River. Alas, our service area hadn't reached there yet. But she did apply once she moved to Shelburne.

"I thought I could use a little more income and it's great having someone else in the house at night," Susan said. "I'm not able to do much of the charity work that I have in the past. With the lack of housing right now, this made sense and it feels like something I can do for someone else. Amelia is my third homeshare guest and she is great company!"

After the trial period, Amelia decided "I don't want to be anywhere else. We got along so well!"

Amelia works from home, taking calls for the gastroenterology and general surgery department for UVMMC, a job she takes great satisfaction in. "It's very rewarding when, at the end of the call, I hear a huge sigh of relief over the

phone and I know that I've taken an enormous weight off of their chest.

"Living here allows me to save for the future because I

avoid the cost of driving back and forth to work everyday. No longer commuting 40minutes is also a great time savings. Now, at 5 o'clock, I clock out and I'm home."

The pair share cooking responsibilities, but dinner needs to be ready exactly at 7. "We try to do dinner and Jeopardy every night," Susan said. "The cooking schedule is on the fridge. We want to sit down for dinner just as the show starts."


Amelia has learned to cook great Italian meals from

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A Note from Connor

few months ago, a longtime friend of HomeShare called me with some concern. Their annual gift hadn't been highlighted on our donor list in our Annual Report as a Polly Rowe Fund gift. These things can happen, so I apologized and looked into it with them. Over the course of the conversation, it became clear they assumed that all their gifts would show up that way because they are a member of the Polly Rowe Society. And then I understood; we have a naming issue here at HomeShare Vermont. Because we assume others have had this same question, I'll outline the differences between the Polly Rowe FUND and the Polly Rowe SOCIETY.

The Polly Rowe Fund

This is HomeShare Vermont's endowment fund. Started by one of our organizational Founding Mothers (Polly) through a generous bequest, this fund acts as a safety net against any number of challenges that might come our way. Donors can earmark their gift for the endowment fund, but otherwise gifts are used to offset program costs. Going forward, we will be referring to this as the Polly Rowe Endowment Fund.

The Polly Rowe Society

This is a select group of donors who have generously decided to include HomeShare Vermont in their estate plans (and have informed us). Some folks choose to include us in their will; others will name us as the beneficiary for their IRA, 401K or life insurance plans. There are a variety of tax advantages to some of these options, so we recommend speaking with a professional to look over your choices with care.

We remain deeply grateful to all our donors, no matter how you support HomeShare Vermont. Our current funding climate is easier to navigate owing to the foresight of folks like Polly Rowe. We could not face these challenges as confidently without your support.

Pe are excited to announce the largest geographic expansion in HomeShare Vermont's 43-year history. HomeShare will soon begin serving all of the Northeast Kingdom (Orleans, Caledonia and Essex Counties), Windham County and the remainder of Windsor County that wasn't covered with our expansion two years ago.

"This is a major step forward in our long-term goal of serving every Vermonter who can benefit from the program," Home-Share Vermont Executive Director Connor Timmons said. "Through the additional support of the State Legislature and our new strategic partners, we are much closer to realizing that goal."

Of course, being HomeShare Vermont, we will be leveraging connections and job sharing to cover these new areas. Much like the successful partnership that was formed in 2023 with the Thompson Senior Center in Woodstock, we will embed HomeShare case managers within organizations that have long histories of serving their respective communities.

In the NEK, we will partner with the Northeast Kingdom Council on Aging. In Windham County and in southern Windsor County, our partner will be the Windham & Windsor Housing Trust.

"We are so fortunate to work with two organizations that know these regions well and are already working with many of the people who can benefit from homesharing – either as a host or a guest," Timmons noted.

After case managers from these two organizations are trained over the next few months, we hope to begin serving these new areas by the end of the summer.
